

#### CROSSING THE GAP - SCIENCE & FAITH

Crossing the Gap - a science and faith project in Harwell and Chilton churches - has been running for a full term and so it seemed a good time to reflect on what we have achieved so far. Crossing the Gap is funded by the World Templeton Charity Foundation through the Scientists in Congregations project. In October our grant, and those awarded to seven other projects, were celebrated with a reception at Bishopthorpe Palace hosted by the Archbishop of York. On the last Friday of each month we have been meeting at 4:30pm at the Church Hall in Harwell for Family Science Club. We do some hands on science, e.g. investigating

the difference between raw and hard boiled eggs (from the outside!), making volcanoes erupt, and building our own electrical lights for Christmas lanterns. This is followed by an exploration of how our experiments might help our faith, or how our faith might help us understand our experiments. Every session concludes with a free meal shared together. It has been a delight to welcome between 20 and 30 people to each session and to see parents and children together exploring science, learning about faith and having fun together.

Each fortnight on a Thursday a science discussion group meet in the lounge at St Matthew's church to discuss the relationship between science and faith. We have enjoyed discussions about miracles and science, and the awe and wonder that can be experienced through science. This coming

term we will complete our sessions about awe and wonder and we will review the Test of Faith material from the Faraday Institute - a perfect introduction to looking at science and faith.

The final stream of the project is to invite guest speakers to the Harwell Campus to give a wider view on



Science and Faith. We were privileged to welcome Professor John Lennox in January as our first speaker giving a lecture titled 'Cosmic Chemistry: Do Science and God mix?'. The event was excellent with nearly 200 people enjoying the lecture. This term we will be joined by Dr Ruth Bancewicz from the Faraday Institute talking to us about 'God in the Lab' which is really exciting! (See front cover for booking information).

#### Science versus Faith?

I was appalled recently when one of my children was asked in class to choose between the scientific and the biblical explanation of the beginnings of the universe. "What if I think they are both true?" asked my conflicted offspring. The teacher didn't seem to be able to cope with this possibility and was unable or unwilling or unable to adjust the lesson plan to accommodate a surprising turn of events. So she insisted on sticking with the dichotomy; science or religion was the choice. And that is the way many people think today, but is, I believe, based on misunderstanding.

If I were to come into a kitchen to find a kettle boiling, I could explain what is happening in terms of the electricity from the cable causing the element to heat up, the heat energy being transferred to the water molecules, increasing

their kinetic energy to the extent that the vapour pressure of the water exceeds that of the ambient atmosphere, and the liquid therefore boiling. That is a scientific explanation. But it is also true that the water is boiling because someone is intending to make a cup of tea. Both explanations are true. One is concerned with process and mechanism and is 'scientific', the other is concerned with purpose and meaning. It would be a nonsense to be forced to choose between the two explanations.

We live in an area of wonderful scientific research and technological innovation, and our local communities and churches are full of those who happily call themselves both scientists and Christians. This month's back page interview features one of them, Dr Tony Hughes.

Feeling the need to somehow have to choose between science and faith is a relatively new thing, and certainly not shared by many scientists, past and present. The possibility of science itself – the discovery of orderly laws by which the universe is governed – is underpinned by Christian beliefs that there is a divine Creator, who has ordered all things, and created human beings in his image with the ability to understand how things are and then creatively apply that knowledge. It can be argued that it was the Christian worldview that gave rise to the scientific revolution in medieval Europe, with scientific pioneers across the disciplines, such as Boyle, Galileo, Mendel, John Ray, Newton and Faraday, being inspired by their faith, as are many leading scientists today.



Kepler expressed it well for those in his field: "astronomers are the priests of God called to interpret the book of nature". The founders of the Royal Society considered the study of nature to be a form of

religious worship and devoted the Society "to the glory of God the Creator and the advantage of the human race".

Both science and theology are concerned with the search for truth. If you are interested in thinking about important things and exploring the relationship between science and the Christian faith, why not consider coming to the talk advertised on the front cover, or the fortnightly discussion group, or the monthly Family Science Club? There is lots of good material online and in print, too.

As it says in Psalm 111:2, and inscribed above the main door of the Cavendish Physics Laboratory in Cambridge,

"Great are the works of the LORD; they are pondered by all who delight in them." Let's ponder together!

#### INTERVIEW WITH TONY HUGHES


I went to school in Newport in South Wales and then read physics at Jesus College Oxford. I met Margaret at school and we came to this area when I did research at the UKAEA Harwell Laboratory for my D.Phil. In those days it was known

as 'Harwell Atomic' to
distinguish it from Harwell
Village. We lived first in a
prefab at Chilton and then
went for two years to Cornell
University in the USA. I am a
'solid state physicist' and the
research that I did involved
experiments at very low
temperatures and a lot of
theory using quantum
mechanics and group theory.
The Didcot Herald used to
describe people like me as 'boffins'.

We came back from the USA in 1969, moved to Harwell Village and have been here ever since. The house we have lived in for over 40 years dates back to the 17th century. The work to keep it up has probably helped with the main church job that I have done for 17 years as Chairman of the Buildings Committee. I've also played in the Orchestra for over 20 years and, through Margaret being leader of the Visiting Team for twelve years, I have collected some involvements in helping people cope with life's problems. We brought up four children and have four grandchildren aged 10 to 18 who keep me on my toes.

In the 1970s I wrestled with whether to keep doing research or get more involved in managing research. I did both for a while and ended up as a Research Director for the UKAEA. Then I moved to the Research Councils before I retired.

I saw a fair bit of the world as a research scientist including Japan and India. Japan is the only place where I've given lectures in my socks and India was an eye-opener. Heathrow seemed like a morgue compared with all the crowds in India.



theologian whose advice is to weigh up the evidence and think hard about what it means.

With my background of Sunday school, school and church when I was growing up I've never had a 'born again' moment, but it was only when I joined the church orchestra that I started going to church regularly again and thought about these things more carefully, rather than just trundling along as a token believer. I was also nudged towards more serious thought by a few other people! I'm very glad to see how the Science and Faith project is now providing a forum for such debate.

On a lighter note, whilst I have a doctorate I am not a 'proper doctor'. I don't often use it myself, but when others have described me as 'Dr Hughes' in hospitals it certainly causes extra deference! My sister used it once before I visited my mother in hospital and the nurses were almost curtsying as I came in. Most embarrassing.
